

In scouting we learn that a "Life well lived" is a life that leaves a legacy for those who follow. Margaret Lee Runbeck speaks of such legacy as she observes that a man leaves "all kinds of footprints when he walks through life, some of which you can see, like his children and his house." Others are invisible, like the prints a man "leaves across other people's lives, the help he gives them and what he has said . . . His jokes, gossip that has hurt others, encouragement. A man doesn't think about it . . . but everywhere he passes, he leaves some kind of mark. These marks added together are what man means."

Harold Kushner states: "Our souls are hungry for meaning, for the sense that we have figured out how to live so that our lives matter, so that the world will be at least a bit different for our having passed through."

Adding to this line of thought, George Macdonald said, " If I can put one touch of a rosy sunset into the life of any man or woman, I shall feel that I have worked with God."

Back to Scouting, there is a poster that reads, "A hundred years from now it will not matter what my bank account was, the sort of house I lived in, or the kind of car I drove. But the world may be different because I was important in the life of a boy."

At the end of many adult leader training courses, participants are given a piece of parchment paper and a pen with the following words inscribed on it, "What do I want my legacy to be." As members of the United Methodist Church strive to live the life God would have them live, it would be easy to answer with a resounding yes to the following question:

"A hundred years from now will the world be any different because I was important in the life of someone?"

Julie Ward Howe, author of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic", asked Senator Charles Summer of Massachusetts to give aid to a needy person. He replied: "Julie, I have become so busy, I can no longer concern myself with individuals. To this, Julia replied, "Charles, that is quite remarkable. Even God hasn't reached that stage yet."
